Directions:

- 1. First, read through the coming-of-age comic, poem, or memoir once through without making any comments. Just enjoy it from start to finish!
- Then, reread the comic, poem, or memoir while considering the following checklist.
- 3. For the memoir or poem, please write all of your comments on the writer's draft, whether a paper copy or an online copy (i.e., Google Docs). For the comic, write your comments on a separate sheet of paper. The writer will use your comments to help improve their draft.

Introduction

- □ If context is needed for the coming-of-age moment, is it kept brief?
- Does the writer quickly immerse the reader into their experience using visual details?

Body

- Does the story focus on one experience, or does it try to cover multiple stories?
- Does the writer make purposeful and effective stylistic/artistic choices to portray their moment vividly? How might the writer use more artistic/stylistic choices to paint a rich picture of their moment?
- Through the writer's stylistic/artistic choices, are you able to infer how they were feeling in this moment and the experience's impact on them?
- Are there any parts of the moment that they describe that seem underdeveloped? Are there any parts that feel unnecessary to the story?

Conclusion

- Does the end of the comic, poem, or memoir create a certain mood?
- □ Is the end written in such a way that you can **infer** what the writer realized about themself, a relationship, and/or the world? Remember that the ending **should not** explicitly tell you what it is they learned.

Point of View and Organization

- Point of view: Is the story written in the first-person point of view from beginning to end? Are there any places where the point of view is unclear, or where the writer switches to another point of view?
- Logical organization: Does the comic, poem, or memoir follow a logical sequence? Is there anywhere that you were confused about the sequence of events? Point those moments out to the writer.
