Revise the sentences from the mentor text to include a dependent clause with a subordinating conjunction by combining existing sentences or adding new details.	Original Sentence: This highlights that men are held to unrealistic expectations. They are discouraged from expressing vulnerable emotions. Revised Sentence: This highlights that men are held to unrealistic expectations <u>because they are discouraged from expressing vulnerable emotions.</u>
