## **Narrative Writing Short Story**

## **Prompt**

Write the opening 1–2 pages of a magical realism short story. In your story's opening, be sure to introduce a realistic setting and character(s), introduce a conflict, incorporate at least one magical or supernatural element that is treated as ordinary, and end on a note of intrigue or suspense to leave the reader wanting more.

Use imagery and sensory details to bring your story and characters to life. Remember, magical realism blurs the line between the ordinary and the extraordinary—the magic should feel woven into the fabric of everyday life.

## **Criteria for Success**

- Story opening is between 300–600 words
- Has an engaging opening that starts in the middle of things
- Has a realistic setting and character(s)
- Introduces a conflict for the main character
- Incorporates a magical/supernatural element that is treated as ordinary and helps reveal the conflict
- Ends on a note of intrigue or suspense
- Contains imagery and sensory details that bring the characters and events to life
